How is PBIS different from other school behavior programs?

- The program is focused on acknowledging students for consistent positive behavior.
- There are expectations for all students, parents, staff, and settings.
- Direct instruction of expected behaviors will occur throughout the school year.
- Routines and language with respect to appropriate school behavior are consistent throughout the school and district.
- Problem behavior will be responded to with consistent consequences that are focused on re-teaching the expected behaviors.

What is PBIS?







PBIS is a process for creating safer and more effective schools. It is a systems approach to enhancing the capacity of schools to educate by developing all children research-based, school-wide, and classroom behavior support systems. The process focuses on improving a school's ability to teach and support positive behavior for all students. Rather than a prescribed program, PBIS provides systems for schools to design, implement, and evaluate effective school-wide, classroom, non-classroom, student and specific plans. PBIS includes school-wide procedures and intended processes for all students and all staff in all settings. PBIS is not a program or a curriculum. It is a team-based process for systemic problem solving, planning, and evaluation. It is an approach to creating a safe and productive learning environment where teachers can teach and all students can learn.
